

#### MEMENTO MORI.

As the liturgical year draws to a close, we hear more about the fact that we will all one day die. The Church doesn't do this to be creepy, but as a reason for hope and a call to action. First, it can help us bear our crosses more patiently, knowing that this life is not the end. St. Teresa of Avila said that all this life's sufferings were like one bad night in a bad hotel. This isn't to minimize our pain, but to recognize that our loving God only allows it in order to bring about proportionate goods. It's also healthy to periodically examine our lives in the light of eternity. I often think of a friend of mine, married over 50 years, who had a heart attack a few years ago. As he lay on a gurney in the ER wondering if he'd live or die, he was at peace knowing he'd loved his wife with all his might. If I were to die tonight, what would I regret? November is the time to repair relationships, make time for those we love and be sure that no important thing goes unsaid—with our loved ones and with God.

# MY FRIEND ST. ANDREW.

Do you ever get the feeling that a particular saint wants to be your friend? That's exactly how I felt a few years back when St. Andrew decided to make his presence known. It began during one of the hardest years of my life. I had been dealing with debilitating anxiety and panic attacks that made the simplest tasks during the day extremely difficult. I was let go from a job unexpectedly right before Thanksgiving, leaving me and my husband to live off of his part time job as he balanced work and graduate school. And on top of things, I was yet again dealing with health issues due to my auto immune disease and the stress being put on my body. In my grief and frustration, I remember constantly repeating to myself that year just how incredibly worthless and <u>weak</u> I felt.

That was until one day while listening to the <u>Restore the Glory Podcast</u>, I was inspired by Dr. Bob Schuchts to search the meaning of my name. He explained that our names not only have power but can lead us towards our identity and mission that God is calling us to. He also encouraged to look to the saints we are named after and to ask them for guidance. Before then I had not given much thought to my given name "Andrea". I was very surprised to find in my Google search that it is a form of Andrew which is both my Dad and Brother's middle name. St. Andrew had been hiding in plain sight in my family's lives and I had no idea how present he truly was. My jaw then almost hit the ground when I continued to read and found what my name actually meant. It derives from a Greek word that means "strength" and "courageous". I felt tears well up in my eyes when I realized the significance of this. Here I was for an entire year calling myself weak, when in reality my name had meant <u>strength</u> all along! But St. Andrew was only getting started!

From that point on, I began to notice how much this "strong" saint and I were linked. Not only did I attend a St. Andrew's parish but I felt very connected to the Chosen's portrayal of St. Andrew and his struggles with anxiety. I also realized that St. Andrew and I both shared in our desire and mission to bring those who we loved closer to Jesus. It was after all Andrew who brought our Lord to meet his brother Simon who would later be called Peter and chosen to lead the Church as pope. As I continued to grow in my devotion, the blessings from St. Andrew seemed to continue to flow. It was then that I found out about the St. Andrew Christmas Novena.

It is piously believed that whoever recites the St. Andrew Christmas novena prayer FIFTEEN times each day beginning on the feast of St. Andrew (November 30th) until Christmas Eve will obtain the favor which they graciously request. Last Christmas, I witnessed the power of this novena first hand when I not only prayed for a family member to come back to the faith but for my husband and myself to have a baby. Not only were both requests granted within this past year but they were fulfilled in better ways than I could have imagined. I would highly encourage you and your family to place your own intentions at the feet of St. Andrew and the baby Jesus this Advent season. You may even find that St. Andrew has been wanting to be your friend as well!

### ST. ANDREW <u>Christmas novena</u>

(To be said 15 times each day from Nov. 30th to Dec 24th)

"Hail and blessed be the hour and moment in which the Son of God was born Of the most pure Virgin Mary, at midnight, in Bethlehem, in the piercing cold. In that hour vouchsafe, I beseech Thee, O my God, to hear my prayer and grant my desires through the merits of Our Savior Jesus Christ, and of His blessed Mother. Amen."



# WALK WITH ONE...OTHER FAMILY! BY LIBBY DUPONT

This summer, Catholics from around the country gathered for local Eucharistic processions which culminated in a huge celebration in Indianapolis, Indiana. In an effort to channel the graces received by these wonderful events into mission, the United States Bishops have invited us to join in an initiative called <u>"Walk with One."</u> This is a simple invitation to genuinely befriend one other person, then to be open to share our faith with them.

As busy families, it can be easy to excuse ourselves from such an invitation. Have you seen what a mess our house is? How crazy our schedules are? Not to mention the way my littles can't stay still or my bigs don't like to come out of their rooms? But what if there was a way to Walk with One, just exactly as you are? There is! Here are the steps the Bishops have outlined, modified for whole families.

1. Identify someone in a spirit of humility. As a family, ask God is if there is another family He is calling you to befriend. Is there a new family in your neighborhood? That family you always talk to on the sidelines at sports? A single mom or dad of one of your kids' friends? Keep in mind that God will often direct you to someone with whom you naturally connect. Maybe your kids get along or you have some other outside interest. This family can have no faith at all, or maybe someone who just occasionally goes to Church.

2. Intercede for that person in communion with the Holy Spirit. You can add this family to your own family's rosary, night prayers or meal graces, or consider spiritually "adopting" them for Advent.

3. Connect in Eucharistic friendship. In this step, there is no agenda except to genuinely show interest in the other family. Start with asking good questions and remembering the answers. When and if it seems appropriate, invite them over for a meal or meet at a park for a playdate. Delight in their goodness, and be open to the ways that God wants to bless you through their friendship.

4. Invite that family on a path most suitable for them. In time, if the family asks questions about your faith, be willing to answer them and witness to the difference it's made in your life. Lean into the Holy Spirit and ask for guidance on what might be good things to invite them to, such as joining your family for a Rosary, coming to a social event at the parish or even joining in a Bible study, youth group or Mass. If our love for God and our love for this other family are sincere, we will naturally want to connect them to each other. Like introducing any two friends, these can be small, incremental invitations that we leave open so that the family we befriend can be free to respond however they like.

# FASTS & FEASTS!

### November 1st, All Saints Day (Holy Day of Obligation)

• Take time this feast to learn something new about a Saint you have felt drawn to or have never heard about before. You can even turn it into a family event by having each family member research a different saint and then share what you learned during or after dinner! Finish by praying for the intercession of these new saintly friends and then enjoying a family dessert or a hot mug of <u>Mulled Cider</u>.

### November 2nd, All Souls Day

• Did you know you can receive one plenary indulgence for a soul in purgatory each day that you visit a cemetery and pray for the dead from November 1st to November 8th? You can also receive a plenary indulgence for a soul in purgatory on November 2nd by devoutly visiting a church or an oratory and reciting an Our Father and the Creed. As always to receive any plenary indulge a person must be in a state of grace, go to confession, receive holy communion (once per indulgence), and pray for the intentions of the Holy Father (once per indulgence). ### November 17th, St. Elizabeth of Hungary

• St. Elizabeth was greatly known for her love of the poor. Legend says that one cold winters day, St. Elizabeth left her castle with her apron filled with bread for the hungry. On her way, she was met by her husband who opened her apron to find it filled with beautiful roses instead. He then kissed her and her face was said to shine with the radiance of heaven. Remember this sweet saint by making this delicious <u>"Rose" Shaped Cinnamon Bread</u>.

### November 30th, St. Andrew

• St. Andrew was a faithful apostle of Jesus who was martyred on an X shaped cross known as a Saltire. It is also piously believed that whoever recites the St. Andrew Christmas novena prayer FIFTEEN times each day from the feast of St. Andrew until Christmas Eve will obtain the favor requested. ### December 8th, Immaculate Conception (**Observed this year on December 9th due to Sunday. Holy Day of Obligation**)

• Celebrate Our Lady's virtue and innocence by having a "White Out" day! Decorate the house with white flowers like Baby's Breath, Daisies, or White Roses! Use white table cloths if you have them to set up an elegant dinner table. Finally try eating all white foods for dinner with your family! ### December 13th, St. Lucia

• It is tradition in multiple countries to make Lussekatter or St Lucia Buns on her feast day! Often made by the eldest daughter of the family while wearing a white gown with a red sash and greenery on her head, these delicious treats are made to be shared and enjoyed with others above all else! Try making these traditional <u>Lussekatter buns</u> or some other baked good to take to friends or a neighbor!

# December 25th, Nativity of Our Lord (Holy Day of Obligation)


### December 26th, St. Stephen






