Finding Better Solutions for Ectopic Pregnancies

A classic application of the **Principle of Double Effect** is the tragic case where a mother has an ectopic pregnancy, and her life is threatened by the implantation and growth of her embryo in one of her fallopian tubes. Modern medicine has yet to find a solution that enables the baby to survive. Some interventions involve directly killing the embryo. These fall into the category of a direct abortion and cannot be done ethically.

Re: Proposed Rule - Department of Veterans Affairs, 38 CFR Part 17. RIN 2900-AS31

On behalf of The National Catholic Bioethics Center, The Catholic Medical Association, The National Association of Catholic Nurses, USA, and The National Catholic Partnership on Disability, we write to support your Proposal to reinstate the full exclusion on abortions and abortion counseling from the Veterans Administration (VA) medical benefits package, which was removed in 2022. We also support the reinstatement of the exclusions on abortion and abortion counseling for Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs (CHAMPVA) that were removed in 2022, and the removal of the unnecessary exclusion which would allow an exception for protecting the life of the mother. As we will indicate, abortion does not represent a necessary “treatment” to save the life of the mother.

A Gift, but with an Expiration Date

In this article by Father Tad, he looks at the bewildering experience of receiving an adverse or terminal diagnosis. He notes how as we age and start to feel poorly, and especially when we struggle with serious or life-threatening illnesses, it can seem that our bodily health is the highest good there is, almost an “absolute” good.

Declining health can trigger feelings of sadness and depression as we sense our life slipping through our fingers, and sometimes can lead to dark temptations like physician-assisted suicide or euthanasia. He notes the importance of recognizing that the afflictions we struggle against can lead us actively to surrender and accept where we are, even as we turn to the One who sees all things and knows the specifics of our situation better than we do.

Chinese Ambassador Slams President Trump's Pro-Life Policies at UN

During a recent UN meeting, China's ambassador accused the Trump administration of undermining women's health by withdrawing financial support from UNFPA, an agency long criticized by pro-life advocates for its ties to China's population control programs. Father Tad Pacholczyk observes how US-backed family planning programs have too often been active forms of “pro-abortion and anti-family imperialism,” and he argues that foreign governments should independently handle such initiatives without any US involvement.

Catholic Scholars Urge Caution as Trump Considers Rescheduling Marijuana

Moral and legal scholars who spoke with CNA recently expressed concern about President Donald Trump's announcement that he might loosen federal restrictions on marijuana. Father Tad

Pacholczyk expressed concerns about rescheduling marijuana, telling CNA that keeping it as a Schedule I drug has “sent a much-needed message to Americans and drawn a kind of moral line for many years.” He noted that “Adults who smoked marijuana regularly during adolescence have decreased neural connectivity (abnormal brain development and fewer fibers) in specific brain regions,” and that loosening restrictions will mean that drug users will regrettably take this as further opportunity to act unethically by seeking “to escape or otherwise suppress their lived conscious experience and instead pursue chemically-altered states of mind, or drug-induced pseudo-experiences.”


The Church’s Guidance on Dying Well

Episode #64: Father Tad on Moral Clarity in a Culture of Feelings



In this episode, Luella Jonk sits down with Father for an extended discussion. From his unique vantage point—having worked as a molecular biologist at Harvard Medical School before answering the call to priesthood, Father Tad brings both scientific rigor and spiritual wisdom to today’s most challenging ethical dilemmas. Today, we often make decisions under pressure, guided by what “feels right” rather than objective truth. Father Tad and Luella explore how this same relativistic thinking that damages our relationships is now reshaping how we approach life, death, and human dignity itself. Among the areas they consider: (1) Why three-parent babies and genetic screening represent a dangerous shift from receiving children as gifts to treating them as products; (2) The hidden moral costs of IVF that most Catholics never learn

about—and why natural fertility approaches offer hope without compromise; (3) How our fear of suffering is driving us toward medical assistance in dying (MAID) and what we lose when we shortcut the grace found in life's final journey; and (4) Why moral relativism—the idea that “it's all up to me to determine right from wrong”—creates chaos in our personal and professional lives.
